The first hybrid in-person and virtual environmental event since the pandemic began, the IUCN Congress will drive action on nature-based recovery, climate change and biodiversity.

By bringing experts, government and non-government voices together from over 160 countries, the Congress carries a powerful mandate. As a key milestone before pivotal UN conferences on biodiversity and climate in Kunming and Glasgow, the IUCN Congress will inform new global targets and action towards a sustainable, healthy future for people and nature.

IUCN Congress – a critical event in a crucial moment

The IUCN Congress in Marseille, France takes place 3-11 September 2021, a month before the UN Convention on Biological Diversity COP15, where governments will set biodiversity targets for the coming decades.

The outcomes of the Congress will frame the debate going into that important event, and will show countries how conserving nature can play a vital role in building back better after the COVID-19 pandemic.





The President of France, Emmanuel Macron, and IUCN see the Congress as a decisive step in how the world rewrites its relationship with nature for decades to come. No prior Host Country has given the Congress such a prominent role in its international agenda.

IUCN Members' Assembly (September 8-10): IUCN members to debate and vote on 18 motions, including the post-2020 biodiversity framework, ocean governance, mining on land and the sea floor and the rights of indigenous peoples in conservation.





Congress policy implications

The IUCN World Conservation Congress is the democratic forum for the global conservation community to express its views. It is a platform for decision makers to announce their intentions and for leading experts to provide guidance on how to turn these intentions into concrete policies on today's most pressing environmental and sustainability challenges, including the biodiversity and climate crises and recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

The need to transform the global financial system and direct more investments away from environmentally destructive activities and into nature-positive projects is another key topic to be discussed in Marseille.

Post-2020 global biodiversity framework journey

At the Convention on Biological Diversity meeting in China (CBD COP15) in October 2021, governments will adopt a new Post-2020 Global Biodiversity Framework to address the 'nature emergency' and the action needed to secure the planet's life support systems. This new Framework will be a truly global framework for all sectors of society.

The IUCN World Conservation Congress comes just one month before CBD adopts this framework. As the largest marketplace of conservation expertise and the only international forum on biodiversity with outcomes decided by governments, civil society and indigenous peoples' together, the IUCN Congress is a unique opportunity to shape the ambition and galvanize the necessary action at levels commensurate with the challenge we all face.

About the host country, France

About Marseille

By declaring a state of climate emergency, the City of Marseille affirmed in December 2020 its willingness to respond to the challenges of climate change and the decline in biodiversity.

Faced with the threat of a major environmental crisis, Marseille, a greener and more resilient city, is adapting to improve the well-being of its inhabitants.

By placing ecology at the heart of its municipal project, it offers solutions to build the city of tomorrow: bringing nature back to the city to capture CO₂, removing waterproofing from concrete spaces, particularly in schoolyards, and creating islands of freshness, accelerating the thermal renovation of municipal buildings, promoting urban agriculture, reducing pollution by encouraging soft mobility and opening up spaces for discussion – these are all concrete and innovative projects in favor of sustainable development and a peaceful living environment for the people of Marseilles and its region.

The IUCN World Conservation Congress in Marseille, the largest international event on biodiversity, should bring strong collective decisions that will guide the environmental agenda for the next decade (2021-2030).

By hosting this major meeting and offering a rich programme "outside the walls" of the Congress, the City of Marseille is positioning itself as a fundamental player in the ecological transition, alongside citizens and local actors who will animate this exceptional week throughout the city.
